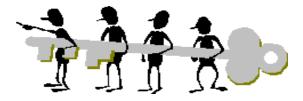




MANDATE UN Counsellors

December 2000 – General Assembly resolution A/RES/55/175

To respond to psychosocial needs of UN staff and dependants through professional counselling, group sessions and training programs that aim to enhance the ability of UN staff members to better cope with their daily routines and the hardship they encounter in the field, especially in cases of emergency.



What kind of issues does counseling deal with ?

Difficulties in personal relationships, emotional and adaptation difficulties



Health concerns.

Work related problems: burn-out, difficult relations with colleagues, work environment

Personal development: communication skills, career related



Specific events: separation, death of a relative, illness,

Substance abuse

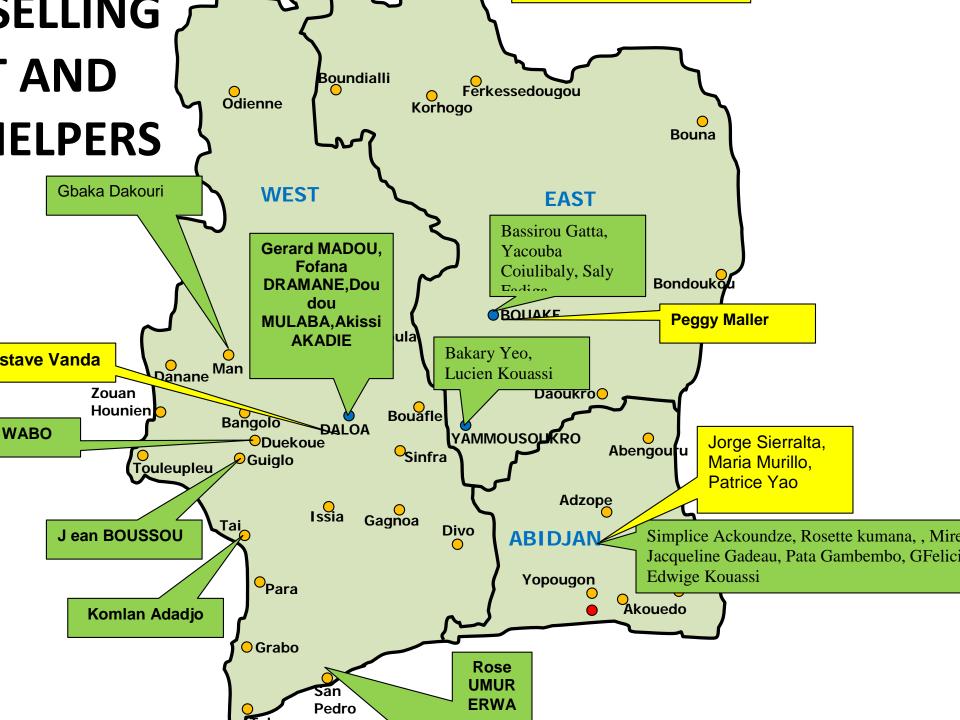
The main areas of work:

- Individual counselling
- Group sessions
- E-bulletins on psychosocial issues
- Training: Stress Management or other trainings.
- Managerial consultations
- Visit al level 3 hospitalized staff
- Crisis preparedness and crisis response
- Referral to other mental health services.

In accordance with the UN ethical standards, strict confidentially is maintained.

Incorrect perceptions on Counseling

- Counseling is for REALLY sick people or psychotics.
- Counselling is only for people who have serious emotional or mental problems.
- It is for the weak persons unable to handle their emotional problems by themselves
- If you choose to seek professional help, you are considered mentally unhealthy.



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
